#### Bilingual Narrative Intervention ISF International Research Workshop

In a world where more than half the population is bilingual due to globalization, mobility and immigration more and more children are being raised and educated in two languages. Children at risk for language disorders are estimated at 7% of preschool and school populations. These numbers pose urgent questions regarding screening, evaluation, treatment, and education. An Israel Science Foundation International Research Workshop in collaboration with Bar-Ilan University will take place on February 21-23, 2023 in order to address some of the challenging issues of educating linguistically diverse populations. The Workshop brings together research scientists from different fields, experts in intervention, experts in narrative studies, and experts in bilingualism and language development in an effort to come to a common research framework and contribute to assessment and intervention of bilingual children. From differential diagnosis to precise intervention, we will share knowledge with renowned scholars from North America, Europe, and Israel.

The two languages of bilingual children are the most important resources they have-for language development and later on for the acquisition of literacy skills. Yet most research on narrative abilities, including narrative intervention studies with bilingual children, has focused on a single language, usually ignoring the home language. The proposed workshop centers on the impact of bilingual narrative intervention in both languages of bilingual preschool children with typical language development (TLD) and with developmental language disorders (DLD) aimed at assisting children to recognize and use key components of narrative structure. These are attested challenges for bilingual children, especially for those with DLD due to low proficiency in both languages, which does not always allow them to rely on a stronger language for scaffolding. The current research addresses issues revolving around three topics:

- Macrostructure and microstructure narrative features
- Bilingual narrative intervention (BINARI)
- Cross-linguistic influence of narrative skills

The main objectives are to examine the impact of Bilingual Narrative Intervention (BINARI) on critical narrative features in BOTH languages and crosslinguistic influence in children with DLD and TLD in two distinct bilingual populations (English-Hebrew/Russian-Hebrew). Critical narrative features being examined include: Story Grammar (SG) elements, vocabulary, morphosyntax, complex syntax, Internal State Terms (ISTs), and referential expressions. Cross-linguistic influence of narrative elements is a unique feature of bilingual language acquisition and can be used to enhance both home language (HL) and societal language (SL) skills.

The workshop will present findings from ISF project 1716/19. It will bring together researchers to explore different intervention models and their macro-micro gains on monolinguals and bilinguals with typical and atypical language development. The workshop casts a net wider than the field of bilingual narrative intervention and includes experts somewhat beyond this specific field (Justice, Nicolopolou, and Bauminger). By providing an opportunity for cross-disciplinary interaction, we expect to improve our understanding of the relative contribution of innate limitations (due to disorder) and narrative intervention in the two languages to the narrative profile of bilingual children.

A Poster session will be held on the first day to allow early career faculty and graduate students an opportunity to present their work and interact with international and local invitees. Early career faculty and graduate students will be encouraged to participate in the full range of workshop talks and activities.
